Your Visit

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Essential information for Teachers

Before your visit

- Risk Assessment. Where possible, we recommend that teachers come on a
 free pre-visit to discuss their needs and to carry out their own risk assessment if
 needed. We have provided our own Risk Assessment below, but please be
 aware that our risk assessment is site specific and may not address all the needs
 of your particular group. Free pre-visit times can be arranged either during or
 after normal school hours.
- Please ensure that all adults and children dress appropriately. The manor can be very cold in the winter.
- Please let us know in advance if any children in your group have specific needs so that museum staff can prepare and ensure everyone gets the most out of their visit.

Arrival

- By Coach. Coach groups can be dropped off on Sycamore Road or Maple Road.
 To avoid congestion, we encourage coach drivers to park at the coach parking at
 Cadbury World after drop off, and not on any of the roads adjacent to the
 museum.
- By Train. Selly Manor Museum is a 15 minute walk from Bournville station.
- **By Bus.** The number 11 Outer Circle bus and the number 27 bus stop at Bournville Village Green, two minutes' walk from Selly Manor.

During your visit

- Please be aware that during a visit to Selly Manor, school staff are responsible for disciplinary matters and First Aid provision.
- The session begins at 10am and finishes at 2pm. If you wish to stay at the site for longer please inform staff before your visit as we can provide resources for teacher-led activities, such as sketching.
- Each class will be led by a member of our Education Team (10am 2pm) which can include:
 - Walking tour of Bournville Village
 - o Hands on activities
 - Storytelling activities.
 - For younger children a shorter visit can be tailored to meet your needs.
 Please arrange this when booking.

Arriving late: We will always do our best to ensure you do as many activities as possible, but if your group arrives late, we may have to cut short or omit some activities.



Lunch

- If the weather is good then schools can take advantage of Selly Manor's garden. If not, schools can use Minworth Greaves, a large medieval hall.
- Please be prepared to ask your children to put their litter into their lunchboxes to take home. We are a small site and do not have the facilities to dispose of large amounts of rubbish.
- There are six toilets at the museum and it may be necessary to stagger groups of children. There is also an accessible toilet.
- Teachers and accompanying adults may like to bring their own hot drinks as there are no facilities for refreshments at Selly Manor.

Shop

- We are a charity and would be very grateful if you could allow your children to use our shop, which helps to support the work of the museum.
- Gift bags (to any value) can be prepared in advance. This should be arranged prior to your visit as stock levels can change.

Adults

- We rely on the willingness of the class teachers and helpers to assist us to ensure your visit is safe and enjoyable. All accompanying adults are free and we require a minimum ratio of **1 adult per 10 children**.
- Selly Manor staff are not responsible for disciplinary matters, this rests with the teacher who is familiar with the children and their own school policy.
- We would be grateful if mobile phones carried by adults are on silent or vibrate so to minimise interruptions during the tour.

Numbers

 We can accommodate a maximum of 90 children per day. Depending on the number you bring, the group may be split into 2 or 3 smaller groups. Each of these smaller groups will be led by a member of our Education Team for the day.

Payment

- Full day (10am 2pm): £8.50 per child, free for all accompanying teachers and helpers.
- As standard, we will invoice for school visits, to the details given when booked, at the end of the month. Payment can alternatively be made on the day by cash, cheque (payable to Bournville Village Trust) or debit or credit card. Groups that have been confirmed and do not turn up will be invoiced for the full amount.

Bournville School Visits

Topic

Discover the heritage of the beautiful model village of Bournville and the important role George Cadbury had in developing it. This session explores how Quaker philosophies inspired the Cadbury family to create a better environment for their workforce, and draws comparisons between the Back to Backs in Birmingham City Centre and the garden village of Bournville. If you would like us to tailor your visit, please discuss this with us when booking.

This session supports a number of Key Stage 1, Key Stage 2 and Key Stage 3 National Curriculum elements including:

- 1. a history topic 'beyond living memory' and 'the lives of significant individuals in the past who have contributed to national and international achievements.'
- 2. 'a local history study' and 'British history that extends pupils' chronological knowledge beyond 1066.'

Getting to Selly Manor Museum



The easiest way to get to Selly Manor is to follow signs for **Cadbury World.** Selly Manor is by Bournville Village Green, across the road from Cadbury World. Children can be dropped off on Sycamore Road or Maple Road, adjacent to the museum. Please do not double park.

Please be aware that Selly Manor is in a residential area, and turn off your engines when you are able to do so. Traffic congestion can be a problem in Bournville so please take care not to block the road.



If you are staying in Bournville until your group leaves, the best option for parking is in the **designated coach park at Cadbury World**. Please do not park on the roads around the museum as this causes congestion.



A History of Selly Manor Museum

Selly Manor Museum is home to two of the oldest buildings in Birmingham. **Selly Manor** is a Tudor house and **Minworth Greaves** is a medieval hall house.

The Laurence Cadbury Collection

Laurence Cadbury

The objects at Selly Manor were mostly collected by Laurence Cadbury. He began collecting antique furniture when he was at university and continued throughout his life.

He visited antiques dealers and gradually assembled a collection of over 500 objects, which all help to show what life would have been like at Selly Manor hundreds of years ago.





Ideas for the classroom



- Ask the children whether they collect things. It might be football cards, certain toys, badges or anything else. Ask them to bring their favourite in to school and tell their friends about why they like it.
- The children could write about their favourite object. If they are learning about the Great Fire of London, what would they save from their house?
 Samuel Pepys famously saved his parmesan cheese!
- Take lots of photos on your visit to Selly Manor. Back at school the children could sketch an object and label it with its name, what it's made of and what it was used for.




Building Material

Building Selly Manor

Selly Manor is a timber-framed building. It is mostly made of oak beams which are fixed together using a mortice and tenon joint and held in place using a wooden peg.

The panels between each beam were once made of wattle and daub. Wattle is a weave of sticks that were slotted in place first. Then mud, clay, manure and straw were spread over the top. Some sections of Selly Manor have a brick infill between the beams, in a herring bone pattern, where the bricks are angled like fish bones. Selly Manor and Minworth Greaves would once have been thatched with straw but now have tiles on the roof.


Ideas for the classroom

- Construct your own timber framed buildings using card and black paper straws.
- Make your own wattle and daub. Use hazel twigs to create a weave of sticks, then mix clay, sand and a little bit of straw to make daub.
 Spread the daub on the wattle using your hands.
- Get lots of pictures of buildings, some old and some new. Ask the children to place them in the order they were built.
